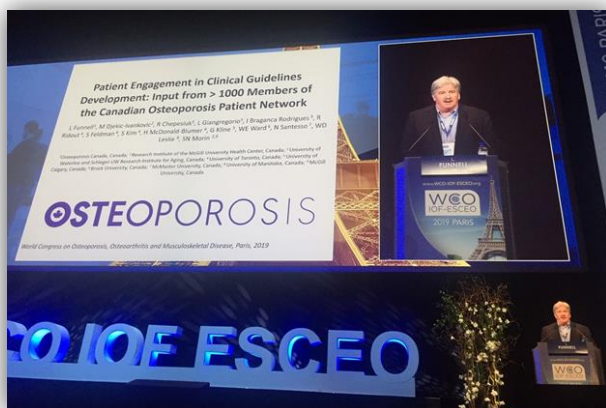
He was presented with this honour by Governor General Julie Payette in Ottawa at Rideau Hall on Thursday March 14, 2019.

ESCEO-IOF 2019 Herbert Fleisch Medal

On April 5, 2019, Dr. Jonathan D. Adachi, a Professor of Medicine at the Michael G. DeGroot School of Medicine at McMaster University, was awarded the prestigious Herbert A. Fleisch ESCEO-IOF Medal at the World Congress on Osteoporosis, Osteoarthritis and Musculoskeletal Diseases. The Medal is named after the late Professor Herbert A. Fleisch, a renowned researcher whose pioneering work has greatly influenced the understanding of bone and mineral metabolism. It is awarded annually by the European Society for Clinical and Economic Aspects of Osteoporosis, Osteoarthritis & Musculoskeletal Diseases (ESCEO) and the International Osteoporosis Foundation (IOF) to a researcher who has made outstanding and innovative contribution in basic or translational science.

ESCEO-AgNovos 2019 Healthcare Young Investigator Award Presented to Ahmed Negm

Ahmed received the AgNovos- ESCEO Young Investigator Award in the World Congress of Osteoporosis- Paris 2019. He received this award on his study titled **FRAILTY INTERVENTIONS TO IMPROVE PHYSICAL PERFORMANCE: A SYSTEMATIC REVIEW AND NETWORK META- ANALYSIS OF RANDOMIZED CONTROLLED TRIALS**. Ahmed's study showed that physical activity with nutritional supplementation and medication management are the most effective in improving physical performance in older adults.



Ahmed received an Osteoporosis Canada Tim Murray Travel Award in 2017.
